Directors Report

Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on the 24th of July 2008 and recognised as a charity on 27 February 2009. The company was established under a memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Risk Management

Internal control mechanisms are in place, such as the countersigning of cheques and bank transactions. An income and expenditure statement is produced monthly for the directors to be able to supervise the activities of the company.

Organisational structure

Many of the day-to-day activities of TTF are taken forward within specific projects and "operational hubs". Project leaders have responsibility for taking these forward within parameters set by the Board of Directors, to which the project leaders report.

The company is managed on a day to day basis by Project Leaders who report to the Board of Directors (meeting every month). The Board of Directors provide legal, strategic and financial governance. The role of the Board is to conduct the business for the Company in accordance with the statutory responsibilities of Directors as set out under the Companies Acts 1985-1989 and 2006. Its roles and responsibilities are set out in detail in TTF's Memorandum and Articles of Association and include setting the company's policy and strategic direction, and managing and overseeing the projection of its public image.

Objects and activities of the charity

The charitable aims for which TTF Ltd is established are as stated in the company's Memorandum of Association:

- a) the advancement of community development,
- b) the advancement of environmental protection and improvement, including the promotion of sustainable development.
- c) the advancement of education, and the promotion of health

Transition Town Forres has three overall strategic aims, which are:

- To improve the situation and outlook of Forres as climate changes and fossil fuel supplies decline by fostering sustainability and resilience in the local community.
- 2 To foster positive planning to lift Forres out of fossil fuel dependency.
- To encourage and promote health, choice and empowerment for the people of Forres and local community networks, within an ecologically and ethically grounded framework.

Achievements and Performance

During the year ending March 31 2018, Transition Town Forres entered a new and very dynamic phase of growth and development. This was in large measure due to the enthusiastic input of a new generation of directors, the contribution of the wider membership through development sessions on Taking Transition Forward, and the appointment of a number of freelance contractors to take forward a range of projects.

The very talented combination of Helen Moore and Rosie Balyuzi, appointed to manage the Centre bookings, enabled a consistent and very professional operational presence in the TTF Centre building, which in turn led to a dramatic increase in Centre bookings both for weekly workshops and different weekend courses.

Their friendly and welcoming approach has also led to an increase in loans of TTF equipment assets, such as the tables and gazebos, which in turn has led to an increase in donations.

Another excellent development has been the appointment of Karen Sutherland to support the treasurer with bookkeeping and financial management. Karen has helped us improve our financial management, providing stronger foundations for our development planning.

Notable projects and achievement for the year include:

1. Let's Eat

funded by NHS Grampian and Awards for All

Project Co ordinators

Rosie Balyuzi and Rob McKenna

Let's Eat entered its third operational year, and ran a large variety of well advertised funded classes in budget cooking, healthy eating, good nutrition and an introduction to a variety of cooking experiences from all parts of the world. Rosie, Rob and their colleagues provided a range of lunchtime and evening classes, including very popular Chinese cooking offered by Therese Poon, and alternatives to chocolate and vegan cooking with Sam Young from Sky Delights. The funding enabled people on low incomes to attend.

Collaboration with other groups and agencies included the Job Centre, Essential Skills, Ray's opportunities and Elgin Youth Café.

The project makes a substantial contribution to furthering TTF's aims regarding healthy living.

An exciting new initiative was Let's Eat funding paying for a part time gardener, Danielle Quist, to grow food in the 20 veggie boxes in TTF grounds, enabling cookery classes to support "from garden to plate" cooking approaches for a wide range of organic herbs and vegetables.

2. Wellbeing Project

funded by Peoples Postcode lottery

Project Coordinator

Emma Stewart

This project entered its second operational year, and has proved hugely popular and successful. The target group for classes is over 50s in the IV36 Forres area with the aim to support health and wellbeing.

There was good liaison with Jo Smithson to facilitate referrals from the Forres GP Practice. Weekly classes were offered in Chi Kung, Yoga, Keep Fit, Arts, Creative Writing and Mindfulness. A volunteer steering group led class planning. A short film was made of the various classes, which attracted an age range from 51 to 87 and has brought a whole new group of local people to learn more about TTF.

Due to the success of the project and appreciative feedback from Centre users, and thanks to the very effective video and the fundraising efforts of Therese Poon, the project has secured funding for the next 2 years.

Thanks go to Emma for her hard work, as well as her warmth and enthusiasm in welcoming all the attendees.

3. TTF Community Gardens

largely self funded through annual fees

This is the oldest ongoing project in TTF, having been on the go for 9 years.

October 2017 marked the retiral of the last 3 year committee of Gelda MacGregor, Frances Robbe and Jim Knox. Organic growing is learned by example and through help from other gardners. We appreciated the tremendous contribution of lan Dey, our workday coordinator and mechanic. A new committee was elected in October 2017, which included Alastair Taylor as Chair, Mike Mair as Vice Chair, Mike Martin as membership secretary and Jamie Walton as Treasurer. We had a full set of working pods at around 65 gardeners and good use of the polytunnels. A number of monthly work afternoons were well attended, and a new development was to start renting out 10 of the small vegetable boxes in main TTF grounds.

It was particularly inspiring to have a literal marriage between TTF projects and the garden, in the form of Alastair and Helen as a couple, and keen gardeners linked to both sides of the hedge.

4. Weekly classes and one off events

Self-funded

As always we are grateful to the ongoing weekly drumming class run by Carol Scorer.

New classes offered included Howling Wolves, a women's singing group. Special events included a storytelling festival, featuring Alastair Taylor, and a Hogmanay party with alternative music. There have been many other occasional room hires as the TTF Centre becomes better known and offered competitive rates for a well-heated practice room with our environmentally friendly biomass boiler.

5. Repair Café

A very popular new initiative started this spring, when Andy Drummond organised and advertised a Saturday monthly "Repair cafe" with paying lunches provided by the Let's Eat team and others, where volunteers offered to repair and recycle various household gadets on site. These were very popular, new to Forres and went viral online!

6. Liaison with other charities: Moray Carshare

Gelda Macgregor led a new initiative to offer accommodation to a sister charity, Moray Carshare, to carry out small bodywork repairs to their car fleet and encourage increased use of our existing electric car charging facility (crowdfunded in 2013 but still under utilised). This initiative prompted a clear out of rubbish and stored goods from the black shed, a space shared by the gardners for wheelbarrows and other equipment.

Board Directors

Thanks go to all the volunteer Board Directors, especially to Holly Hendry, a great secretary, and Karen Higginbottom, who, throughout the winter months, was a very dynamic Chair. She introduced a lot of fun and tight organsiation to our monthly Board meetings.

We organised a much needed November office clear out, three strategic development meetings, and two marketing and communications discussions.

We welcomed Andrew Drummond, who has been tremendously helpful in carrying out an asset register of TTF electric goods, and working for many hours to recreate and upgrade the existing TTF website, which had become out of date over the previous 2 years.

Thanks go to Fabio Villani for providing an ongoing link with TTF's early days, as one of the founding directors in 2009, and to support for new directors from **tsi**MORAY. This included a course on Financial Management facilitated by **tsi**MORAY's Edward Fitsell.

Gelda MacGregor's contribution has already been noted above, and thanks must also go to lain Findlay; his knowledge of the circular economy has informed the Board's decisions, while his practical skills have helped their implementation.

Last but not least, we owe a huge debt to Kristy Puplett, who retired from the Board after many years' service, both as a Director and as a volunteer; thank you Kristy!

Investment policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are few funds for long term investment.

Financial Review

During the year the charity received funding and donations totalling £27,868. Total resources expended were £53,060, resulting in a net deficit of £25,192. £13,181 of this expenditure was the depreciation charge for the year.

Principal Funding Sources

The main source of income for the charity has been grants.

Reserves policy

The board of directors has examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. There is currently £66,017 of reserves which is primarily made up of assets (£26,784) and debtors (prepaid lease) of £5,880. Actual cash held at bank at the year end totalled £36,961.

Plans for the future

TTF's plans for the future are to increase the use of the Environmental Education and Healthy Living Centre. There are now practical & educational programmes around healthy food. Focus will be placed on how to grow & cook local & seasonal food and to provide information on the impact of food for wellbeing.

Responsibilities of the Board of Directors

Company law requires the Board of Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the Board of Directors should follow best practice and:

- 1. Make suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- 2. Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- 3. Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The Board of Directors is also responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that they financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The Board of Directors is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Reporting Accountant

Faith Simpson, Chartered Certified Accountant, was appointed as the Reporting Accountant in the current year and has expressed her willingness to be reappointed at the AGM.

a Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 And the Charities and Trustees Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

b Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

c Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Voluntary income is recorded on a cash received basis.

Investment income is included when receivable.

Incoming resources from charitable activities are accounted for when earned.

d Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure is includes any vat which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries.

Costs of managing and administering the charity represent costs incurred by finance, human resources, accounting, legal and other costs attributable to the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

e Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:
